

The growth of the Capital Region's creative industries rests on its ability to attract, develop and retain talented, creative and entrepreneurial workers. Companies throughout the Capital Region depend on imaginative and innovative applicants who have a wide range of skills, can quickly adapt to change, envision new products and develop new markets.

These beliefs are the reason behind many of the creative programs developed by the School of the Performing Arts at Proctors, including TheatreTECH.

The demand for skilled theatre technicians continues to grow. According to the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics, Audio and Video technician jobs are projected to grow by 12.9% by 2026. Additionally, In the Capital Region, Performing Arts employment is up 17.5% over five years (2010-2015), from 3,227 jobs to 3,791 jobs. Performing Arts is the fastest growing sector of the Capital Region Creative Industries.

In addition, by drawing on our extensive network of professional production companies, we develop new opportunities for hands-on training and direct observation of working professionals for students in the program.

This level of backstage access is unprecedented in the world of professional theatre and includes both touring Broadway producers such as Disney Theatricals, Troika Entertainment and off-Broadway production companies such as New York Stage Originals.

Once students reach a specific level of expertise, they can be hired as paid technicians for performance groups staging their shows in the Addy Theatre, or hired as Off-Bradway and Touring Broadway Apprentices.




